Dear Friends,

Some time in the mid-1980s I heard a sermon in St George's Tron delivered by an American preacher called Ronald Dunn. It was an exposition of the familiar parable of the Prodigal Son but the preacher was given grace that day to make it throb with meaning and relevance. I can still remember the points which were driven home and illuminated with helpful illustrations.

What I did not know that day – and I only found this out two years ago – was that Ronald Dunn was in the midst of a deep depression which had been brought about by the death of his son who had taken his own life. This was to last with varying degrees of darkness for about ten years. He writes about this experience in his book *When Heaven Is Silent* along with other challenging personal circumstances which brought him to the edge of his personal resources.

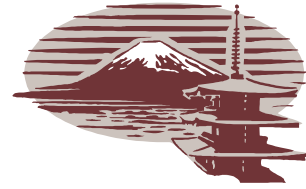
What keeps coming through in the book is that although he continues to ask the question 'Why?' he understands that he will never get an answer this side of eternity. He quotes another Christian writer Philip Yancey: 'The emphasis I see in the Bible is not to look backward and find out if God is responsible in order to accuse him ... The emphasis is rather on looking ahead to what God can make of seeming tragedy.' In his own words Dunn writes: "Why me?" is a useless question, for in the end it solves nothing. Only when we face up to the inadequacy of this question will we be free to ask the right one.' The right question, according to Dunn, is 'What now?' This acknowledges that despite the depth and the pain of our personal tragedy God is present, He is working out His good and loving purpose, and we can be part of that.

There is a chapter in Dunn's book entitled: 'What Now?' The final words are: 'As for myself, I confess I'm still trying to get an answer to my 'why?' And I'm still getting the silent treatment. But it's all right. I trust Him. For the present I'll settle for a 'what now?'

I like this because it helps me to understand that I can live with my own personal 'whys' and yet still find purpose in God's 'What now?'

There will be many challenges which lie ahead but it's a joy to be in the place where the Lord would have us. Do keep praying for the many in Hiragishi who need to hear about Jesus.

John MK Paterson

My first contact with John Paterson was my first General Assembly in 1984 when he was Moderator. It was probably one of the most dramatic and controversial of Assemblies of the twentieth century and required the person in the Chair to have a clear head, a firm grasp of procedure and a willingness to let all sides of a debate to be clearly expressed.

John showed all of these qualities and was less dependant on the guidance of the Principal Clerk than many of the people who have followed him in the Moderator's Chair.

Not that his conduct of the business was merely efficient. It was done with a warm-heartedness and frequent humour which endeared him to many of us. As an example of this, when he was installed as Moderator on the first day of the Assembly he expressed thanks to all those whose influence had led him to that day, not least his wife Jill who he said was 'one of those women who married a gentleman and then discovered that she had married a minister'.

That was a reference to the fact that John entered the ministry only after his war service in the RAF and then a career in insurance. It was in East Africa that he came under the influence of Rev David Steele and the conviction began to form that he was being called to the ministry.

After study at Edinburgh University he was inducted St John's Parish Church in Bathgate in 1964 and then St Paul's in 1970.

When John addressed the General Assembly for the first time as Moderator he said he was there as 'an ordinary parish minister, engaged like all other ordinary parish ministers in the privilege of preaching week by week, celebrating the Sacraments and undertaking the daily round which goes on from a thousand manses up and down the land.'

For all John's achievements as a Convener of important General Assembly Committees and as Moderator it is as a parish minister that he will be remembered best in Milngavie. For the inspiration of his preaching, his care of the sick and the bereaved, his influence on a significant number of young men who entered the ministry, the time he took with people who were struggling with difficult issues – we are grateful that he was given the heart and the opportunity to do all of this.

While that should be considered sufficient for good and faithful service we must also remember how John expanded the vision of the work here in St Paul's. Under his direction there were regular Summer Mission teams that gave young people an experience of Christian outreach; there was the establishment of Friendship House which was ahead of its time in establishing an ecumenical witness in the community; and there was the setting up of a trust for a technical college in Sagalla Kenya. All of these areas of work have benefited people beyond the walls of St Paul's where the Gospel needs to be proclaimed.

On a personal note. I know colleagues who followed long and distinguished ministries who felt that they were constantly overshadowed by their predecessors and, indeed in some cases, their continuing influence on the congregation. That was never the intention of John and in fact he did everything to prepare the way for whoever would follow him. He made it clear that his successor should be given every opportunity to be his own man and that the congregation should expect changes.

I will always be grateful for that along with the too few contacts I had with him over the years and the many letters of encouragement which I will treasure.

Our prayers are with Jill and the rest of the family in the hope that they will find the comforts of the Gospel that John so faithfully preached.

Dates for Your Diary – Sun Kids will be happening on the following Saturdays this session.

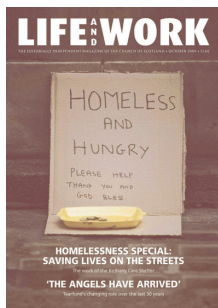
November 14 2009, 16th January 2010, March 20 2010 and 22nd May 2010.

Kimo Work Party July 2009

On Monday 29th June at 5.00a.m. a bleary-eyed group of sixteen of us assembled at Glasgow airport for the start of our adventure, our trip to the Peruvian jungle. Three others were travelling separately and we would be joined in Lima by Calum Munro from the Vine Trust office who was coordinating our trip and accompanying us throughout the visit. Three flights and almost twenty-four hours later we landed at Lima with most, but not all, of our luggage.

The next day we were shown something of the work in Lima of the Vine Trust and Scripture Union Peru and we began to appreciate some of their normal problems : a workers' strike had prevented any pupils from reaching the School for the Deaf which is run by S.U.. We met the staff and heard about their work and their hopes for new and improved facilities. Afterwards we visited the S.U. headquarters which also house the Lima home for street boys. We had lunch with them and tried out our Spanish with varying degrees of success! A number of the staff shared some insights into the work and highlighted the appalling conditions in which the boys live before coming to the home.

On Wednesday we had a ten-hour bus journey which took us to 16,000 feet in the Andes before dropping down again and finally reaching the river bank opposite Kimo. There we had an early encounter with one of the locals when, in the gloaming, a snake slithered across the boot of one of our party. We had been looking forward to our journey across the river in a cage which is operated by a pulley system – it was fun! Unfortunately it was already dark so we could not see the amazing view which we had been anticipating eagerly. The next morning, however, we were thrilled by the beauty of our jungle surroundings as we awoke in the campsite which is near the site of the boys' home which St. Paul's is funding.

After breakfast we climbed the steep track up to the site of the home to be confronted with our main task, clearing dense weeds and many scattered stones from the ground around the buildings and preparing internal surfaces for cement floors.

Another group spent the first morning trying vainly to move two enormous boulders which blocked the road up to the home – eventually the army moved in with a bulldozer to do the job! Some people spent hours digging sand from the river bed which was then taken up to the site and used to make cement. Later on we also fitted some of the wooden panels which form the walls of the home. With their thatched roofs and wooden walls the finished buildings will look most attractive.

We had to remember to have plenty of breaks for water because of the heat and of course we needed to top up our suntan cream and insect repellent regularly. We enjoyed working together and shared lots of laughs, especially as we got to know one another better! It was good to have members of the group from outwith St. Paul's and to enjoy fellowship with them

In the evenings at Kimo we were privileged to hear from Paul Clark, the General Director of S.U. Peru about the history of the work among street children and the amazing experiences of Christians of God's love and power during the reign of terror of the Shining Path, a Communist group which tried to take control of the country and considered Christians as amongst its principal enemies.

We also learnt that Kimo has been an important Christian centre for over thirty years.

Unfortunately our time at the Kimo site was curtailed because of more strikes. It seems to be the custom in Peru to block roads with large rocks during strikes and had we not left for Lima two days early we would have been trapped there for some time. A compensation was that we had more time to explore Lima –and the markets (especially Chris)! We then flew to Cusco, the old Inca capital high in the Andes and travelled by coach to the Sacred Valley where we spent three nights. We worked for a day at the newest of the boys' homes, made possible by a generous Scottish benefactor. It was good to meet the boys and share in the life of the home, which gave us an insight into what our home in Kimo will be like. Another highlight of our

time in the Sacred Valley was our visit to Machu Picchu, the abandoned city of the Incas lost in the mountains. It was easy to see why it is considered one of the wonders of the modern world.

Then it was back to Lima for our flights home to Glasgow via Miami and London. For us all it was an unforgettable experience and we are looking forward to getting together to renew our friendships and share our memories. It is exciting to think that early in the New Year the first boys will be living in the home.

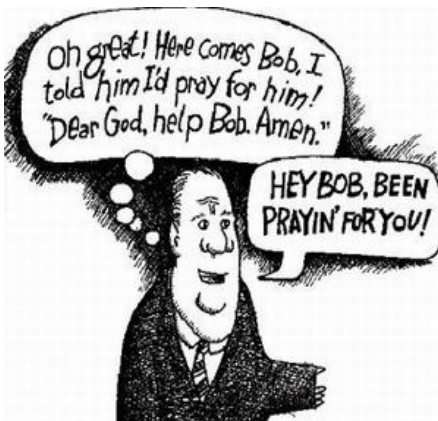

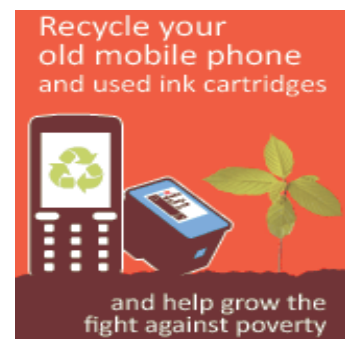
